



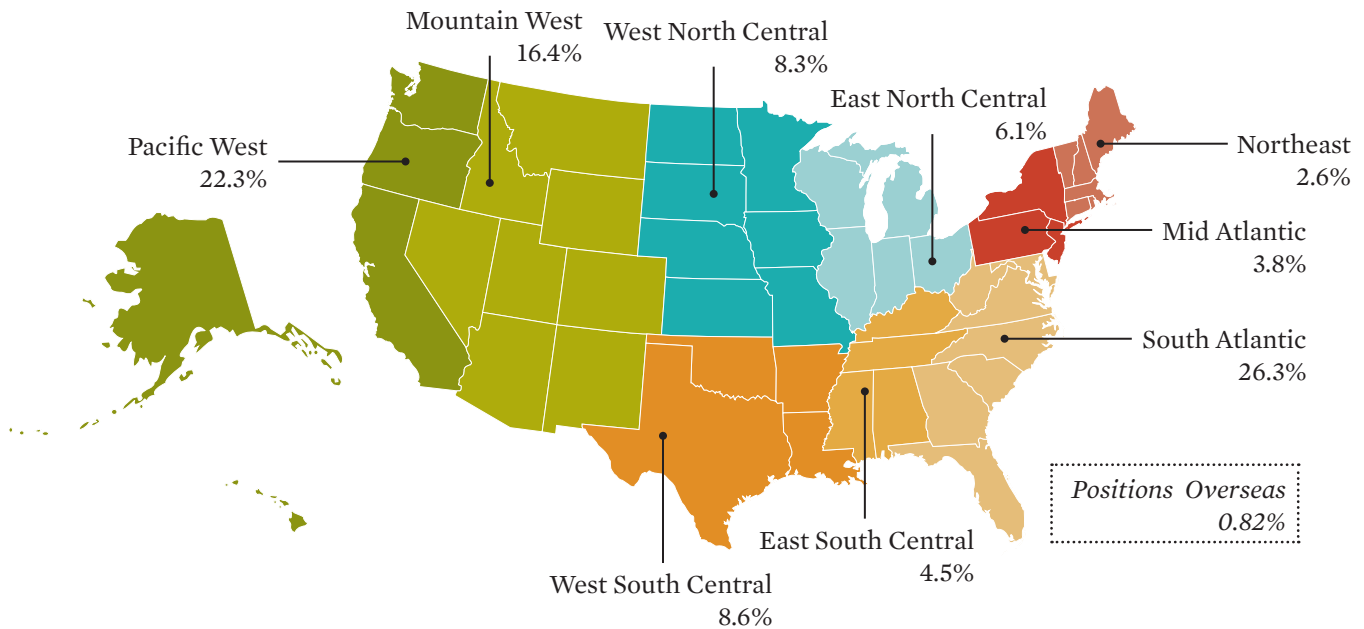

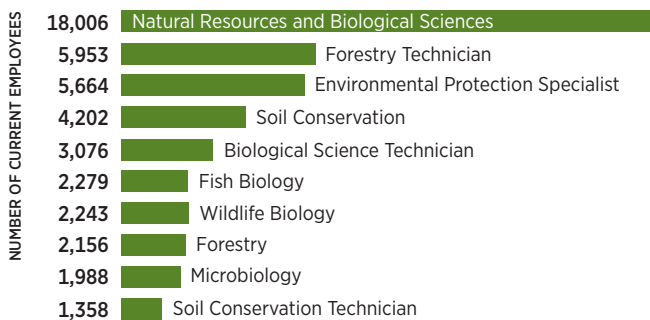
Are you interested in pursuing a job in a biological or environmental science field? The federal government offers a variety of opportunities for individuals with knowledge and skills in biology, forestry, natural resource management, soil conservation and more. For example, a research fishery biologist conducts oceanic research for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, a fire ecologist monitors the effects of wildfires for the National Park Service and an Environmental Protection Specialist minimizes the environmental impact of public transportation for the Federal Transit Administration.

Biological & Environmental Sciences Positions by Region

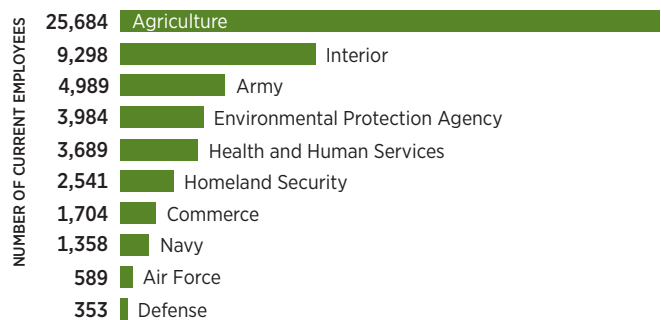


Top Biological & Environmental Sciences Fields

Did You Know?

- Environmental Protection Specialists aren't just employed with the Environmental Protection Agency. They work across government, at agencies including the Department of Transportation, the Department of Veterans Affairs and even the Department of the Treasury.
- Top states with biological and environmental sciences jobs include California, Oregon, Florida and Georgia.
- For most entry-level jobs in the biological and environmental sciences, you need a bachelor's degree from an accredited four-year university with a major in a related scientific field.

- Conduct research on the effects of environmental contaminants on the stages of fish development
- Produce scientific reports and research publications

Agency: Foreign Agricultural Service
Salary Range: \$75,000-\$116,000/year
Location: *Washington, D.C.*

As an Agricultural Science Analyst, you will:

- Provide scientific support for the development of innovative agricultural production technologies
- Work to open and expand foreign markets for U.S. agricultural products, improve agricultural productivity and food security and foster economic growth
