



Are you interested in pursuing a job in a security or protection field? The federal government offers a variety of opportunities for individuals with knowledge and skills in investigation, compliance, security, customs and more. For example, economists monitor consumer financial markets to ensure compliance with federal laws at the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, criminal investigators ensure our borders are secure at Immigration and Customs Enforcement, and safety compliance specialists ensure federal aviation regulations are met at the Department of the Interior.

Examples of Job Positions

Transportation Security Officer (1802)

Department: Department of Homeland Security Agency: Transportation Security Administration

Salary Range: \$29,000-\$43,000/year

Location: Multiple

As a security officer, you will:

- Operate screening equipment to identify dangerous objects
- Perform searches, to include hand-wand and patdown searches
- · Control terminal entry and exit points

Criminal Investigator (1811)

Department: Department of Homeland Security Agency: Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Salary Range: \$84,000-\$110,000/year

Location: Ottawa, Canada

As a criminal investigator, you will:

- Represent ICE in negotiations with foreign representatives on high-level issues
- Supervise ICE Criminal Investigators
- Manage operational, financial and administrative facets of the office
- Plan, organize and coordinate ICE activities throughout the foreign area of responsibility
