






The federal government offers a variety of opportunities for individuals with knowledge and skills in community planning, economics, psychology, social work and more. For example, psychologists help assess and rehabilitate the mental health illnesses of veterans at the Department of Veterans Affairs. Sports specialists create and manage physical activity for the armed forces in the Department of the Army and archivists manage and preserve historical documents at the National Archives and Records Administration.

## **Social Sciences Positions by Region**




# **Top Social Sciences Fields**

#### 1. Do Your Research.

Explore a variety of positions and agencies, then focus your search to a few that align best with your interests and skills.

#### 2. Visit Agency Websites.

Learn more about an agency's mission, structure and current hiring on their website.

#### 3. Create an account on USAJOBS.gov

Save your job searches, build your resume and search for positions at USAJOBS.gov
