
PARTNERSHIP FOR PUBLIC SERVICE

The federal government offers a variety of opportunities for individuals with knowledge and skills in traffic management, highway safety, air traffic control, and more. For example, air traffic controllers coordinate the safe takeoff and landing of aircrafts at the Federal Aviation Administration, railroad safety inspectors ensure trains are able to reach their destinations at the Federal Railroad Administration and fire logisitics dispatchers play a vital role in eliminating forest fires with the U.S. Forest Service.
